## Headlines of the Past, a Prediction of the Future Beta Tau Demonstrates Leadership at Active and Alumni Levels

#### **Beta Tau Leadership**

We as Beta Tau men, both active and alumni, have successfully resonated a track record of success but must vigilantly work to maintain these standards. In the summer 2016 issue of *The Rainbow*, an article titled "A New Generation of Explorers" prompted a reflection on the notable accomplishments of Beta Tau alumni. I predict a bright future for the outstanding young men of Beta Tau and am confident they will make significant triumphs.

The "Delt Stories" article detailed the achievements of **Jay Keasling '86**. He is a pioneer in synthetic biology who grew up on a farm in Harvard, Nebraska. After graduating from UNL, he went to the University of Michigan for his Ph.D.

"He moved westward for post doctorate work in biochemistry at Stanford University, followed by a faculty position he's held at the University of California, Berkeley for almost 24 years. A professor of chemical and biomolecular engineering and bioengineering, he is also Berkeley lab's associate lab director of biosciences and CEO of the Joint BioEnergy Institute, focused on engineering biology to produce biofuels."

I learned of his contributions to world health in developing an engineered yeast microbe to produce a powerful antimalarial drug. He is also working to produce biofuels and their products.

Beta Tau has a rich history of leadership and accomplishment on campus and as alumni, and I believe we will continue this tradition for many years to come. We have an impressive group of executives and brothers in the undergraduate chapter, and they worked diligently during summer and fall recruitment to bring our chapter total up to 138 young men.

#### **Philanthropy**

The men of Beta Tau continue to lead by example in their philanthropic activities. In addition to the JDRF fundraising walk in April, they work with the VA in Lincoln



and the Friendship Home. To supplement these efforts, they started a GoFundMe initiative, targeting alumni, community members, and other Greek organizations, to support the local Friendship Home and the Walk a Mile in Her Shoes event. ## Paul Bauer '07 Gives Back to a Chapter That Helped Him Grow

For **Paul Bauer '07**, a return to Lincoln offered an opportunity to give back to the chapter he so deeply loves and that helped him become the man he is today.

Born in a small, rural area on a farm in Morse Bluff, Nebraska, Paul was not sure a big university like UNL was the place for him, much less joining a fraternity. However, he knew **Tom Wolf '62** and his family, who are from North Bend where Paul went to high school. It was Tom who piqued Paul's interest in fraternities, telling Paul to "keep the Delt chapter in mind," and he did just that.

"My time as an undergraduate meant a lot of great things to me, and if it weren't for Beta Tau, I don't know if college, especially at such a big university, would have been something I would have finished," Paul said. "My first semester did not go well, but joining Delt got me on track."

Paul thanks his brothers for helping him get through classes and the executive team for being friendly and approachable when he was having a difficult time. To help with his academic struggles, they assisted him in finding better study practices during the mandatory freshmen study hours. This hands-on approach helped Paul get over his first semester struggles, and turned an overwhelming city atmosphere into a small and comfortable one. They also inspired Paul to serve as summer house manager, floor manager, and guide.

"The consistency and self-discipline were the biggest things the chapter taught me. With all of our meetings, it was important to manage time wisely. Like life, the more you stay at it, the easier it becomes," he said. "I also learned that it is OK to ask for help. It was important to know that it is never weak to do so, and in fact, it is one of the strengths of being in a fraternity. As Emmerson said, 'Every man who I meet is my superior in some way, and in that I learn from him.'"

In January, Paul moved back to Lincoln for a job running a Complete Nutrition and working as their top health coach. This move not only opened up a lot of opportunities to stay connected with Beta Tau, but also gave him an opportunity to join the alumni association.

"It is important for me to give back to Beta Tau because of the advice we can offer to our undergraduate brothers. The conversations I have had with alumni were illuminating, and it is a great feeling having someone look up to you and for you to be able to reciprocate with your own knowledge," Paul said. "All this shows the importance of brotherhood, and even though the years differ, our brothers are the only ones who truly know what we went through."

In his spare time, Paul helps at his parents' farm, is active at the gym, and hopes to get back into CrossFit soon. He also attends the practices of the Lincoln Continentals barbershop choir as a baritone. One of the songs they sing that he likes is "There Is No Place Like Nebraska" because he used to sing that when he sang in college. However, Paul's work as a health coach keeps him busy, and his time with the group is limited.

Paul also rescued a labradane boxer mix named Maverick. Paul is a big Dallas Mavericks fan and Beta Tau also had a long history of Top Gun references on passed-down shirts and posters during his time as an active member.

## Chapter Eternal

**Roy N. Neil, M.D. '57** entered Chapter Eternal on March 16, 2016, in Excelsior Springs, Mo., comfortably and of natural causes related to a long-term medical condition.

During his 30 years of private practice, Roy, along with his wife, Elizabeth, operated the Health and Nutrition Center at the mall in Hays, Kan. The Center was an integral and supportive part of Roy's medical philosophy that included whole foods nutrition and vitamin and mineral supplements. Roy spent many evenings and weekends reading leading-edge medical journals/books, researching the mindbody connection, studying the field of quantum physics, and talking with various colleagues in the research fields of medicine and science. Toward the end of his years in private practice, he was asked to speak at KU Medical Center about his pioneering knowledge of chelation therapy and other complementary modalities that proved highly successful with patients in his practice. Roy was a lifelong learner in the fields of medicine and science and was a gifted physician who loved his work and many people.

Other interests included his family, the natural world, and Native American and western history. He particularly enjoyed the mountains of Colorado at Crested Butte and Aspen. He enjoyed western movies and country western music. Roy's favorite holiday was Independence Day with plenty of big fireworks. He wasn't a man who cared much about worldly possessions, but did treasure a set of Native American flutes given to him by a Lakota medicine man and always wore his Lucchese cowboy boots.

Dennis M. Novicki '59 entered Chapter Eternal on December 17, 2015, after a tragic medical accident at the Cathevization Lab in St. Vincent's Hospital in Green Bay, Wis. Dennis was president of the chapter in the 1960s. He is survived by his wife, Lois, (Continued on page 4)
